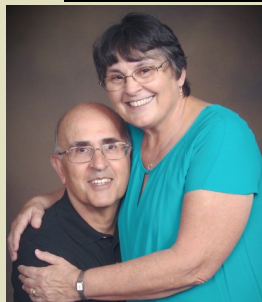

MISSIONARIES**



Dave grew up in Massachusetts and Lucille in New York. They were saved as children at ten and nine years old respectively and later committed their lives to world missions. Dave graduated from Bellevue & Mills Schools of Nursing, New York University, Roberts Wesleyan College and Moody Bible Institute. He served in the Navy during the Vietnam conflict at the Great Lakes Naval Hospital in the Nurse Corps. He retired from the Naval Reserves as a Commander in 1995. Lucille graduated from Bryant & Stratton School of Business and Moody Bible Institute and has been active in Children and Youth ministries.

Dave & Lucille served in Congo (Zaire) from 1973 to 1987. From 1988-2000 they served as the Midwest Regional Administrators for AIM. In the Congo they held a variety of positions including: dorm parents at Rethy Academy, missionary nurse and bookkeeper; coordinated a community health program for 32 village clinics; coordinated the field's orientation program for new missionaries; purchased supplies for missionaries; and were active in church and mission spiritual ministries and leadership.

They came to Media in August 2009. They have been able to return to Africa for three short term assignments and enjoyed being able to serve the Lord and be with family since their two children serve in Africa as well. Dave and Lucille are active at their church helping to fill Sunday School craft supplies for classes, leading small groups, filling backpacks with food for needy school children, and working with the senior ministries. They enjoy reading, walking, kayaking, bicycling and spending time with their college-age grandchildren when they come for visits.

Evelyn Schulz



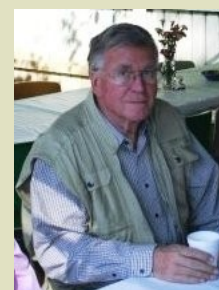
Evelyn was saved at age 5. She graduated from Lancaster General Hospital and went to The Kings College as school nurse. Her goal was to go to Africa and in the spring of 1954 she went to Tanganyika where she was assigned to work at the Kola Ndoto Hospital. She also helped at Rethy Hospital in Congo for 6 months. During her various assignments in the hospital she was free to have outreach ministry and she started a Sunday School at the nearby Williamson Diamond Mines with 15 attending which grew to 250. Some of the hospital staff would assist in teaching. She was also able to be free to help for the week of girls camp each year.

During her 4th term she returned to the USA due to the illness of her parents and worked at Hershey Medical Center. Within 7 years both parents were with the Lord but not until she had the privilege of her mother giving consent to Jack Schulz for her daughter's hand in marriage. Jack had a son and daughter from a previous marriage so she had a family which has given 2 great grand sons. They were married for 25 years and had retired to Ft. Myers where Jack succumbed to a stroke and went to be with the Lord. Evelyn moved to Media 3 years ago where she is enjoying the AIM family plus the gorgeous view of the lake. Her nursing skills are put to use in assisting with dressings and medicine preparation when needed.

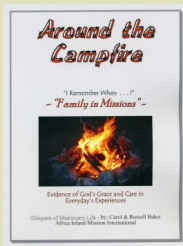
BOOKS WRITTEN BY OUR RESIDENTS

Eldoret Missionary College - From Vision to Reality

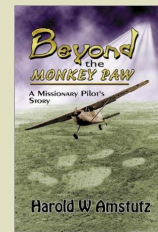

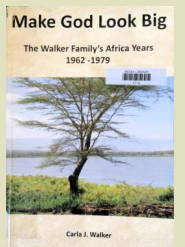
