The Caterpillar (Worm) and the Butterfly

We see lots of butterflies at Media and look forward to seeing them appear each year. Peggy Bragg has caught some of these beauties with her camera. There is something joyful and peaceful about watching them flit from flower to flower drinking in the nectar.



Have you ever seen a butterfly develop. It is most intriguing and magical. They start out as tiny eggs (about the size of dot). These hatch into caterpillars with a voracious appetite. When they have finally had their fill and shed their skin a few times, they attach to a limb, a cocoon develops and the transformation begins. The caterpillar dies as the cocoon forms. After a



couple of weeks a crack develops and a butterfly starts to emerge. It is not beautiful - it is wet and weak and it's wings are crumpled and will emerge as something beautiful but an hour or so later comes this gorgeous new creature perfectly designed by God.

Many compare this process to Christ's death and resurrection. It is a beautiful

picture. But others have compared it to Christians and their new life in Christ. We are born with the ability to become beautiful and unique, though it may take time to get there. Spiritually, we start life as sinners (caterpillars) and have a voracious appetite for wrong doing. It is not a pretty sight. This is not how God wants us to be. Like the caterpillar we

Chuck was born in Los Angles, CA. Although he and his family attended church they never heard the gospel there. It was not until 9th grade when a schoolmate witnessed to him and he accepted Christ as Savior soon after. In High School Chuck met Ruth Dix's mother, Grace King who was a counsellor there. She and her husband were Chuck's mentor's for many years. Chuck was a wood and metal shop teacher to Jr. High students in LA schools for 40 years. He has 2 children Sharon and Craig After his first wife died in November 2000, he was wondering what God wanted him to do next. He visited Kenya (RVA) with Ted & Mary Honer in June 2001 and fell in love with teaching there. He returned to the US, applied

to AIM and returned to RVA in September 2001. He taught wood or metal shop for a total of 53 years.

Esther was born in Toronto, Canada into a Christian Home. Her grandparents were missionaries with SIM, Guy and Joyce Playfair, so she had a missionary influence in my life. She became a Christian at age 5 and attended camp as a teenager. Later she was a counsellor and staff member of the camp.
