MEET SOME OF THE MISSIONARIES

Rusty grew up in Tanzania. Carol grew up in Brooklyn, NY. Both responded to God's call to be missionaries at a young age and in preparation for this graduated from Philadelphia Biblical University (then, Philadelphia Bible Institute and now Cairn University). Their ministry in Tanzania, East Africa, with the Africa Inland Mission began in 1956. Ministry there was mainly in construction, evangelism and church planting, children and women's work and in Mission administration.

After spending 26+ years in Tanzania, they were moved to Kenya to work in the Mission's International Office in the areas of Personnel and Finance and were involved with TEE and teaching Bible in public schools. When the International Office was moved to Bristol, England, in 1985 they again moved and spent 4 years there in Mission administration. Being administratively over the newer AIM areas gave opportunity to travel to many different countries to encourage and help missionaries as they worked through administrative matters.

In 1990, the Bakers were loaned to an organization in New Jersey which provides housing for missionaries on home assignment and were involved in management of the accommodations, bookings and provide other services for these missionaries. At the same time they were over-seeing AIM's Adopt a People Program and coordinating USA-wide prayer groups, providing them with monthly news and prayer items.

In mid-1998, they moved to Front Royal, Virginia and from there coordinated the Mission's Adopt-A-People Program as well its USA-wide Monthly Prayer Groups along with presenting Mission Workshops to various churches.

In mid 2004, they arrived at Media. Carol continues with the USA-wide Prayer Group ministry. They are involved in the Minneola Alliance Church in teaching Sunday School, Ladies Bible Study, and AWANA. In the summer of 2005 they made a trip to Alaska where they ministered at a Bible Camp teaching missions and Bible lessons. Rusty and Carol also spent time in Seoul, Korea teaching at the AIM Korea Missionary Training School. They have four children and 11 grandchildren.

After Frank Toews death in a plane accident in Kenya, his wife Tiffany and their four children returned to the United States and, after a time, Tiffany took up an assignment to help in the kitchen at the New Scott Home.

Sharing meals with residents and other retirees at the Center gives them opportunities to converse, developing their ears to our way of speaking English and their eyes and minds to our body language and cultural cues. As they help with setting up before

meals and cleaning up after, they brighten the lives of those around them. Daniel is surrounded by people who could be his grandparents and even a few great grandparents. His ready smile, sparkly eyes and busy hands give us joy and remind us of other special little people in our lives over the years.

Tim and Hanna are making good progress in hearing our American English and learning to interpret some of the things that we do that appear distinctly different than is done at home in Korea. Their vocabularies are growing and they're getting used to the crazy way that English turns sentences upside down to ask questions! (In Korean, they can accomplish the same thing with a simple inflection of their voices.) In the weeks before us, Tim and Hanna will continue to pursue conversations with those around them at the Retirement Center and in the surrounding community, learning from the experiences we have had and knowledge we have gleaned.
