MALCOLM AND BARBARA COLLINS

"Malcolm was adopted into the Barnett Clan as his mother was the daughter of Grandpa Barnett who went to Kenya in 1907. You might say Malcolm was raised in missions. Malcolm's father translated the Bible into Pokot so translation was modeled and, by God's grace, a talent of his. God led in his adoption. Barbara, on the other hand, grew up in a liturgical tradition that sang "We've a Story to Tell to the Nations". Dating Malcolm, she learned about AIM. Adoption and marriage brought us into missions. Our churches con-



firmed our direction as our support was promised before we were accepted by AIM. All pieces of God's puzzle fit together perfectly in His time.

"Five children later, they moved to Nairobi. There Malcolm was asked by Jonathan Hildebrandt to join AIC leaders planning the formation of the AIC Missionary College. This was phase 2 and their "story to the nations" found a broader audience with students from all over East Africa and Korea. At one point there was no common language for teaching. A diverse staff with diverse students was certainly telling God's story to the nations! When the last of the five children went to college, Collins Clan Parentals shifted to the USA, landing eventually in Minneapolis. Many Somali live there and their language is Cushitic like Rendilli. Malcolm returned to his love of languages and international people. Barbara worked in Spiritual Formation and Outreach for her church plus ESL and then chaplaincy in assisted living. Missions was still their love.

"We now journey the road of dementia and Parkinson's Disease for Malcolm but the love of prayer he learned from Grandpa Barnett, the love of reading Scripture and singing still fortify his soul and Barbara is learning more and more about "the gift of presence" she was taught in chaplaincy. We pray as you read about our lives that what you really see is the wonderfulness of a God who "adopts" the unwanted, who can even work with an urbanite who couldn't tell a sheep from a goat, and who makes
