Meet some of the Missionaries

WAYNE & JOYCE RAYCHARD

Wayne and Joyce grew up in Maine. After serving in the Marine Corps for four years Wayne enrolled at the Univ. of So. Maine. He met Joyce there on the first day where she was pursuing her love for Art. Joyce says, "At the age of 7, Jesus got hold of my heart at a Good News Club; He's never let go."



Wayne was not a Christian and Joyce introduced him to her friends and Inter-Varsity Fellowship. At first Joyce told Wayne there could be no meaningful relationship but he attended her church and through that he gave his life to Christ. Wayne grew in his relationship to Christ and they were married in 1975.

Former TEAM missionaries, Hank & Margie Bock, became mentors to them and they attended the Urbana Conf. in 1976 to learn more about Missions. After graduation they moved to Columbia to attend Columbia Grad School of Bible & Missions for a year. Various events led them to Kenya in 1978 and they taught for three years at a high school in Mukaa Ukambani. Upon their return to Maine, Wayne served as Youth Director at their church and then returned to Columbia to continue his Master of Divinity program.


During this time they had three children and Joyce was very busy at home. They continued to seek God's direction for cross-cultural involvement. After graduating with his Masters degree in 1985 they left for Kenya under CBFMS and God blessed them with being part of a team that planted five churches among the Digo and Duruma people. Joyce especially enjoyed homeschooling their children. In 1999 they returned to Maine and both taught at New England Bible College. Joyce continued homeschooling as well as substituting at the local high school as well as selling some of her artwork. Their three children married and started families of their own and Wayne completed his Doctor of Ministry program at Gordon-Conwell Theol. Sem.

In 2008 they returned to work with outreach teams to the Digo people in Tanzania, this time under AIM. After 8 years they had to make a quick exit as Joyce was diagnosed with state 3C primary peritoneal cancer and six months of chemo followed. Joyce says: "Fast forward to 2021 in which I am declared cured from cancer. God's ways are higher! We moved to Media and became caregivers at the Manor and now are Media residents."

Wayne & Joyce recently had the opportunity to travel to Indonesia and Australia.


Bobbi & Melissa got to "fly high" when Doug, Virginias's son and his company, came to update the PA system at the Manor.
