Meet some of the Missionaries

RUSS & MARY ANN MILLER

Russ Miller was born in 1939 at Rethy, Belgian Congo, the son of Harry & Dorothy Miller. Russ grew up at Rethy and during their first furlough in 1946, he was saved through the ministry of evangelist singer Redd Harper. They returned to Congo and on their next furlough in 1952 Russ stayed behind to attend Hampden DuBois Academy in Zellwood, Fl, graduating from there in 1958. He attended Moody Bible Institute and believed the Lord wanted him to be a missionary. During his time at Moody, he was drafted into the US Army for 2 years during the Vietnam Conflict. He qualified for electronic research and was sent to Fort Huachuca, AZ. It was during this time he decided to get married and live off base.

Mary Ann was born in Volga, S.D., the oldest of 4 children of Charles & Mary Shook. Mary Ann grew up in a Christian pastor's home where reading Bible stories was common. At 3 years old she was looking at a familiar picture in a Bible story book - Jesus hanging on the cross - and suddenly realized that Jesus had died for her sins and started to cry. Her mother carefully talked to her and led her to Jesus. Mary Ann graduated from Wheaton College in 1958 with a degree in Christian Education, went to work for Scripture Press, and was involved at Wheaton Bible Church. Russ and Mary Ann met when Russ was assigned by Moody to do his practical Christian work assignment at the same church. Soon after, Russ was drafted. They were married in August 1964. After his discharge Russ attended John Brown University and received a degree in biology and chemistry and certification as a high school teacher.

They applied to AIM in 1969 and after raising support were assigned to teach at Dungu, DR Congo. From that time on they were involved in teaching in schools and TEE classes among the Zande people in Congo and CAR (most of the time traveling by motorcycle or bicycle), as well as training teachers, leading women's Bible studies, well drilling, building/maintenance work. They also served as MK dorm parents at Victoria Primary School at Nassa, Tanzania, as well as building homes for the Nassa Theological College.

Because of major health issues they resigned from AIM and returned to the USA in 1995. Later God led them to Belgium to become involved in helping with preparing and culturally adapting Sunday School lessons for children in French-speaking Africa. The 8-year Sunday School curriculum in French for African children continues to be used in these countries.

In 2005 the Millers retired to Spring Hill, FL, where God provided a place for them to live and become involved in a local church. After living there 17 years they moved to Media in December 2021. They give praise for the opportunities over the years given them by God. The Millers have three children, Ron, Susan and Jon.
